### "LET'S TALK RECOVERY" WITH KATHLEEN H. AND GUEST, DAWN F.

*1.Dawn, What is your sobriety date?* June 22, 1997

#### 2. What is your home group?

# 2. Dawn, you identify as being "Blessed by Alcoholism." What do you mean by that?

I am blessed by alcoholism because if it hadn't been for alcohol, I wouldn't have found Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) and been gifted with the life I have today. Today I am connected with friends, family, AA, and God that would not have been possible without AA.

#### 3. You are passionate about AA. Why?

I love AA because AA changes people inside out.

## 4. Getting sober is not easy. What was getting sober like for you?

Getting sober was excruciatingly painful and wonderful. Getting sober stopped the voices in my head. It stopped the demonic dreams. It stopped the yearning for alcohol.

# 5. AA gives us a program of recovery. What are the keys to your sobriety?

For me the key to sobriety is to "keep coming back." I also pray and meditate daily. Meetings and prayers recharge my batteries.

#### 6. Many newcomers struggle with finding a Higer Power. How has your concept of a Higher Power changed?

My concept of a Higher Power grows as I become more open-minded. Words are inadequate to describe my Higher Power today.

# 7. What is your advice to the newcomer who is struggling to get sober?

My advice to the newcomer is to lean in. Let us help you and love you.

8. What is your approach to sponsorship? I commit one hour one week for each sponsee. I ask them to commit as well. We commit to working the twelve steps and twelve traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous. I expect them to call and to make meetings as well.

# 9. What role has service played in your recovery?

I have always had a service commitment. Today, most of my service is through sponsorship. I sponsor one to seven sponsees a week.

#### 10. What do you do every day to stay sober?

To stay sober, I talk to God. I meditate. I go to meetings regularly. I read other spiritual literature. I talk to sponsees.

11. Alcoholism kills, steals and destroys. What has AA given back to you?.

AA has given me my children back. AA has given me relationships. Today I like myself. I love myself. I love everyone and everything. I am deeply grateful.

My sobriety date is May 19, 2005. My home group is Live at Five that meets at 5:00 pm at the Bay Area Club. I am a writer and have published articles in the AA Grapevine. - 3. We will relive the past and won't be able to shut the door on it.
- 4. We will comprehend the word CONFLICT and we will know PAIN.
- 5. No matter how far down the scale we have gone, we will sink even lower.
- 6. That feeling of uselessness and self-pity will deepen.
- 7. We will gain interest in selfish things and lose interest in our fellows.
- 8. Self esteem will slip away.
- 9. Our whole attitude and outlook upon life will SUCK.
- 10. Fear our people and of economic insecurity will multiply.
- 11. We will intuitively know how to run from situations which never used to bother us.

12. We will suddenly realize that God would never have done to us what we are doing to ourselves.

Are these extravagant promises? We think not! They are being fulfilled among those of us who are still drinking; sometimes quickly, sometimes slowly......

### SMASHED DELUSION




